Minister's Meditation

Band-aids for Broken Hearts

Because I care deeply about you, please do not read my meditation today if you are sorely distressed about the recent spate of gun violence. I will understand.

As of this writing, eighteen people have died in two mass shootings since March 16. In 2020, the FBI reported a 40% rise in background checks, meaning a 40% rise in gun sales. In 2020, the number of mass shootings skyrocketed to 611. It is past time for us to demand gun safety measures to protect all of us. We are grieving the loss of too many to gun violence, not just in mass shootings but tens of thousands every year. I cannot accept the abominable claim that the death of innocents is the price of freedom. That means absolutely nothing; nothing to the millions of loved ones of those killed for being in the wrong place at the wrong time, or being the wrong color, or gender, or political party - the list goes on. We are not guaranteed the right to intimidate or kill people even if we somehow think it necessary. It is the responsibility of all of us to make it as difficult as possible for that to happen, and, if it does, to prove it necessary in a court system free of bias. This is not a political or a cultural issue, it is a moral and a spiritual issue.

Gun violence robs the humanity of the perpetrator as well as the victim. We are human. We are more than the sum of our fears, more resourceful, more resilient, more capable of understanding than we give ourselves credit for. We can be done with this assault on our humanity.

When I was in high school, we had a gun club that focused on skills and safety. Becoming a member of the NRA meant one pursued competency, maybe even excellence, in a sport. Some of you hunt regularly and enjoy target practice. You are not hunting human beings or preparing to do so or even imagining that you would. That requires a mindset that is profoundly disconnected from one's humanity. A couple of years after I graduated, a faction of the NRA redirected the hundred-year-old association toward opposing gun control and protecting gun rights. Since then, every effort to mandate something as basic as background checks has been stymied in Congress. According to a nationwide poll conducted by USA Today and Suffolk University in August, 2019, 90% of Americans, including 74% of NRA members, support background checks.

So far, we have been offered only weak band-aids to bind our grief; weak posturing, blaming, and pretending violence is not a public health menace. We deserve more. Rev. Sarah

Such welcome news that come May first, Covid-19 vaccines will become available to all people aged 16 and older. 



The Racial Justice Committee is winding up the remainder of this church year with the following film discussions and activities. You will notice that there are three activities scheduled throughout this segment. For those who wish to join, we will be doing:

the Wampanoag Ancestors Walk in Plymouth on Saturday, May 1;

the 28-day journaling exercise based on the book *Me & White Supremacy* on **Saturday, May 22**; and holding a vigil at the church on **Saturday, June 19**, to commemorate Juneteenth.

What Can I Do About Racism?

For 5 months now, fifteen to twenty of us have been meeting every other Saturday to talk about a film or readings about racial justice. Over and over, sentiments like "I wasn't educated about racism" or "I don't talk about racism with other white people" or "I don't want to feel guilty" have come up. So now we are proposing that we undertake a self-exploratory project to address these points head-on, most especially to begin to answer the all-pervasive question of "What do I do?"

Writer and speaker Layla Saad has written a fairly short and wonderful book called *Me and White Supremacy*. As the foreword of the book, written by Robin DiAngelo, says: "White Fragility" states, this book is a "resource for white people willing to align what they profess to value (racial equality) with their actual practice (antiracist action)." It is meant as 28-day "work-book" that we propose we do, each on our own, over the period of April 1 to May 21 (you can begin sooner if you choose). Then on May 22 we will gather on Zoom to share what we learned about ourselves, how we came to consider new ways we can continue to grow and where we think we can go from here, together and individually. This will mean buying the book and taking time on most days to do a short reading, some contemplation and a bit of journaling. But we think this will be very much worthwhile for those of us who participate, including a wonderful opportunity to share our thoughts together on May 22. Please consider joining us in this unique endeavor.

with Natalie Johnson Sunday, April 11 6:00 – 6:45 p.m.



MINUTES OF THE VIRTUAL PARISH COMMITTEE MEETING March 17, 2021

Present: Jim Bonnar, Bob Waterman, Marc MacQueen, Katie Allen, Rev. Sarah Person, Lois Aldrich,

<u>Minister's Report:</u> Rev. Sarah reviewed the Minister's Report for March. Main focus is that building repairs are needed to the chancel ceiling, walls and steps. The work on the roof worsened the cracks in the ceiling, and dust has been settling in the chancel area and into organ pipes. Paul Macuch, the building contractor who has extensive experience working on older houses of worship, will be submitting a plan for making needed repairs and painting.

Due to his consulting business, Dan Hotchkiss may be more limited in what he can provide for adult education this coming church year. He has proposed a new curriculum, which Rev. Sarah will review.

Nicole Sykes asked if there is any planning going on for the re-opening of in-person church, once people are vaccinated. Rev. Sarah would like to see a "hybrid" model when in-person church re-opens, with the ability to continue virtual capability for those that are unable to participate in person. Rev. Sarah suggests a Safety Committee be formed to develop a plan for the re-opening of in-person church.

<u>Cash in the Plate:</u> The Social Justice Committee will make recommendations for April recipients.

<u>Treasurer's Report:</u> Marc MacQueen shared the most recent budget report. Overall, church funds are in good shape. Revenue is on target for this year. We may have a surplus at the end of this fiscal year but need to take into account PPP carry over and special gifts, which likely will not be available this coming year.

Both Marc MacQueen and Eileen Smith report they are feeling more comfortable with accounts, reports, and Quick Books on-line due to assistance provided by Liz Snay. However, some questions still remain. Rev. Sarah suggests Marc and Eileen pull together a list of questions for Liz to clarify some of our questions.

Quarterly Budget meeting is scheduled for March 21, after the service. Marc included budget reports (both long and short form) in the UU Updates that were recently sent out to the congregation. There was discussion around changes in the budget for next year. Include in March 21 meeting any new or additional expenses, such as: new committees (social justice initiatives), any technical needs to continue virtual services post pandemic, increases in salaries and professional expenses. Our goal should be to fully fund the budget without using deficit spending.

Pledge goal for 2021-22 is estimated to be \$180,000. The congregation should be aware of why this pledge goal is greater than last year's, and what the additional money will fund.

<u>RE</u>: Kelly Lownds provided an update on RE. Junior and Senior Youth will start meeting in person this month, outdoors, with masks. They are planning for a June service and a play. Curriculum has been focused on "Be the Change" and discussing racial justice. Dungeons and Dragons group is ongoing and has been successful. Continuing to meet with younger children, offering various activities, involving kids in planning.

Rick Benard and Bill Howe have volunteered to teach youth about basic financial planning.

CORI for staff needs to be renewed for new church year.

<u>Pledge Drive Update:</u> Gil Cote provided an update on the Pledge Drive. Materials (pledge cards, thank you cards) have come in. Pledge team in place. Waiting for pledge package (letter, brochure) to send to pledge Stewards (who will send to their assigned church members/friends). Since in-person visits are not possible this year, Stewards will be communicating to their assigned church members/friends either by phone or Zoom. Rev. Sarah offered to provide Zoom links if needed. There was discussion around the need for pledge forms, and the decision was made to continue to use pledge forms to maintain records. The steward will complete the form over the phone/Zoom and mail to member.

Some discussion on the brochure but will follow up on it and Jim Bonnar's letter at the next PC meeting.
