
VIRTUAL NEW MOON MEDITATION

MINUTES OF THE VIRTUAL PARISH COMMITTEE MEETING June 16, 2021

Present: Jim Bonnar, Bob Waterman, Marc MacQueen, Rev. Sarah Person, Lois Aldrich, Eileen Smith, Katie Allen

Guest: Bill Howe

The PC approved minutes from 6/2/21 meeting.

Minister's Report: Rev. Sarah reviewed her report to the PC. Safety Committee is working on draft protocols for the re-opening of Church. The goal is to have the needed resources to offer multi-platform services upon church re-opening and to ensure all in-person Church activity is safe. This means there may need to be a limited number of people allowed in Church at any given time, with proper social distancing. Rev. Sarah will provide PC with any updates from the Safety Committee.

Rev. Sarah and Andrea Priest have been approached by the Rotary Club asking if our Church would be interested in having a library box on UU property. Rev. Sarah provided details on what this would entail in her report to the PC. Rotary Club would work with a contractor to install the box. Financial assistance is available through various sponsors. Rotary also has some books available. Questions/concerns from PC include: How does having a library box fit in with our UU principles? Do we have the needed resources to manage this on an ongoing basis? Are there any protocols around the type of books, and who decides which books are put in the box? If the Church agrees to have a library box, and then it does not work out, what are protocols to remove the box? Having and managing a library box could be considered outreach for UU, and perhaps a way to attract more members. Rev. Sarah will follow up with PC questions.

<u>Treasurer's Report:</u> Marc MacQueen reports that 87% of 20-21 pledges are in. Income is exceeding expenses for this year. Bob Waterman asked if a final budget for the 20-21 year could be shared with the congregation once all final numbers are in. Marc agreed to work on this.

The PC agreed to continue having quarterly congregation meetings where the PC will provide the congregation with quarterly budget reports.

Leadership Development Team continues to seek to find someone to fill the Assistant Treasurer position, which will be vacant as of July 1, 2021.

PC discussed the need for education of congregation around planned giving for church. One idea would be to have workshops on planned giving offered to the congregation.

Marc mentioned that \$10,000 has been made available by generous donors toward the 2100 Growth Fund.

<u>2100 Growth Fund</u>: Bill Howe presented a summary of the 2100 Growth Fund that is planned to begin in the 21-22 Church year. Bill recommends the Church set up the fund with Charles Schwab. Since the focus of the 2100 Growth Fund is on long-term growth, there will be more volatility, more risk, and therefore keeping this fund separate from all other church accounts is highly recommended. The PC agreed that the fund will be with Charles Schwab. Jim Bonnar will sign the necessary documents to set up the fund.

The plan would be to wait for 3 years before drawing on the investment. The PC can set ground rules as to the amount to be withdrawn, etc. The Church's Investment Committee would oversee the fund, and it has not yet been decided whether investments will be in mutual funds or individual companies. The Investment Committee currently reports to the Treasurer on a monthly basis, and this will continue. The PC will have further discussion on whether or not a Financial Advisory group needs to be established to plan financial strategy and policy for the Church.

Bill cautions setting any restrictions at this juncture around types of investments for this fund. Funds identified as "socially responsible" investments may have different meaning to different people. The UUA may have resources on socially responsible investing.

<u>Music Committee</u>: Focus of the Committee has been on promotion of car rally fundraiser. Application to use town hall parking lot needs to be made, and Rev. Sarah will sign application.

RE: RE most recent report is included in the Church's Annual Report.

Fundraising: Bob Waterman reported that the Spring auction has so far raised \$2657!!

<u>Recordings of Meetings</u>: The question as to whether or not congregation meetings should be recorded was raised at the Annual Meeting and tabled for PC discussion. The PC members agreed recordings of congregation meetings are not necessary. Recordings are not required by the UUA. However, minutes of meetings are taken by the Clerk and shared with the congregation in UU Updates.

Cash in the Plate: Rev. Sarah will ask Social Justice Committee for ideas.

PC Retreat: PC will plan its retreat for the summer. Maybe in person!!!?

PC members extended their gratitude to Eileen Smith for her many years of outstanding service as the Church's Assistant Treasurer. Many, many thanks Eileen!!
